#### 2019 HAPPENINGS IN US DISABILITY SOCCER:

#### United Soccer Coaches Online Module Development:

We are excited to share our group's progress on an online e-Learning course that is set to launch next year. The course's goal is to educate coaches on various disabilities and to give them tools to successfully include players with disabilities. If you'll be at the Convention, please stop by our open meeting to hear more about the module's development!

#### US Paralympic National Team:

The 7-a-side National Team won the bronze medal at the Parapan American Games in August. This was the program's first Parapan medal. Their success is a continued trend as they placed third at the 2018 IFCPF America's Championship in Equador and sixth at the 2019 IFCPF World Cup in Spain!

#### **US Deaf National Teams:**

The Men's team went 4-0 at the PANAMDES in November, winning their first international event! This also ensured their qualification for the 2020 Deaf World Cup and 2021 Deaflympics. The Women's team continues to train in preparation for the 2020 and 2021 cycles, having already qualified for these vents.

#### **US Power Team:**

The US Power team had a successful showing at the America's Cup in Brazil in August, which helped them qualify for the 2021 World Cup. The team is already preparing for this 2021 event, which will be held in Australia.

#### **US Youth TOPSOCCER:**

US Youth Soccer will hold its first ever national TOPSoccer Coaches Symposium at the Pinnacle National Training Center in Kansas City, Kansas on March 27-29, 2020. The symposium will highlight various speakers on numerous topics related to adaptive soccer programming. Our coaching certification course will be offered along with social and networking events. ### Paralympic Development Program partnership with ODP and Shirley Ryan Ability:

Illinois Youth Soccer, the state affiliate for US Youth Soccer, will be partnering with the Shirley Ryan Ability Lab in Chicago to co-host 4 Paralympic soccer clinics in 2020 to youth players in the Chicago area. The focus of the clinics will be to teach soccer skills and identify players for Paralympic Teams at various age levels. Those wishing to pursue team training will be offered a similar training format as the traditional Olympic Development Program (ODP) and will play competitive games using the Paralympic 7v7 format. ## CONGRATULATIONS TO OUR 2019 AWARD OF EXCELLENCE WINNER, CHRIS FINN!

Finn was the head coach of the United States Power Soccer Team that won the 2007 and 2011 FIPFA World Cups, the 2013 FIPFA U-18 Championships and the 2014 FIPFA Copa America Championships. He also served as vice president with the FIPFA international governing body for the sport from 2006-2013. Chris has also coached two United States Power Soccer Association President Cup Championships in 2014 and 2011. He suffered a freak fall in 1992 while in college that caused vertebra damage and paralysis. He later moved to California and discovered power soccer, quickly able to play and coach internationally with a power wheelchair. He now is an advocate for athletes with disabilities and a motivational speaker, inspiring hundreds of individuals and attracting attention to the abilities and needs nationally and internationally.
